

The First Sunday after Trinity

A reading from the Prophet Jeremiah, chapter 23, beginning at the 23rd verse.

This passage may be found in your pew Bible on page 898.

(Pause to allow parishioners to find the page.)

“*Am* I a God near at hand,” says
the LORD,
“And not a God afar off?
Can anyone hide himself in secret
places,
So I shall not see him?” says the
LORD;
“Do I not fill heaven and earth?”
says the LORD.

“I have heard what the prophets have
said who prophesy lies in My name,
saying, ‘I have dreamed, I have
dreamed!’ How long will *this* be in
the heart of the prophets who
prophesy lies? Indeed *they are*
prophets of the deceit of their own
heart, who try to make My people
forget My name by their dreams
which everyone tells his neighbor, as
their fathers forgot My name for
Baal.

“The prophet who has a dream,
let him tell a dream;

And he who has My word, let
him speak My word faithfully.
What *is* the chaff to the wheat?”
says the LORD.

“*Is* not My word like a fire?” says
the LORD,
“And like a hammer *that* breaks
the rock in pieces?

“Therefore behold, I *am* against the
prophets,” says the LORD, “who
steal My words every one from his
neighbor. Behold, I *am* against the
prophets,” says the LORD, “who use
their tongues and say, ‘He says.’
Behold, I *am* against those who
prophesy false dreams,” says the
LORD, “and tell them, and cause My
people to err by their lies and by
their recklessness. Yet I did not send
them or command them; therefore
they shall not profit this people at
all,” says the LORD.

The First Sunday after Trinity

The Psalter – Psalm 89:1-19

MY song shall be alway of the loving-kindness of the LORD; * with my mouth will I ever be showing thy truth from one generation to another.

For I have said, Mercy shall be set up for ever; * thy truth shalt thou stablish in the heavens.

I have made a covenant with my chosen; * I have sworn unto David my servant:

Thy seed will I stablish for ever, * and set up thy throne from one generation to another.

O LORD, the very heavens shall praise thy wondrous works; * and thy truth in the congregation of the saints.

For who is he among the clouds, * that shall be compared unto the LORD?

And what is he among the gods, * that shall be like unto the LORD?

God is very greatly to be feared in the council of the saints, * and to be had in reverence of all them that are round about him.

O Lord God of hosts, who is like unto thee? * thy truth, most mighty LORD, is on every side.

Thou rulest the raging of the sea; * thou stillest the waves thereof when they arise.

Thou hast subdued Egypt, and destroyed it; *

thou hast scattered thine enemies abroad with thy mighty arm.

The heavens are thine, the earth also is thine; * thou hast laid the foundation of the round world, and all that therein is.

Thou hast made the north and the south; * Tabor and Hermon shall rejoice in thy Name.

Thou hast a mighty arm; * strong is thy hand, and high is thy right hand.

Righteousness and equity are the habitation of thy seat; * mercy and truth shall go before thy face.

Blessed is the people, O LORD, that can rejoice in thee; * they shall walk in the light of thy countenance.

Their delight shall be daily in thy Name; * and in thy righteousness shall they make their boast.

For thou art the glory of their strength, * and in thy loving-kindness thou shalt lift up our horns.

The First Sunday after Trinity

A reading from the First Epistle of St. John, chapter 4, beginning at the 7th verse.

This passage may be found in the Book of Common Prayer on page 211.

(Pause to allow parishioners to find the page.)

BELOVED, let us love one another: for love is of God, and every one that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God. He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love. In this was manifested the love of God toward us, because that God sent his only-begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him. Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another. No man hath seen God at any time. If we love one another, God dwelleth in us, and his love is perfected in us. Hereby know we that we dwell in him, and he in us; because he hath given us of his Spirit. And we have seen, and do testify, that the Father sent the Son to be the Saviour of the world. Whosoever

shall confess that Jesus is the Son of God, God dwelleth in him, and he in God. And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him. Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgement; because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear; because fear hath torment: he that feareth is not made perfect in love. We love him, because he first loved us. If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen? And this commandment have we from him, that he who loveth God love his brother also.

(Pause for a count of 5)
